It is a great honor for me to stand with you for the first time today at this meaningful event as the newly appointed Ambassador of the Republic of Korea to the Kingdom of the Netherlands.

Your remarkable valor, particularly in battles such as *Hoengseong* and the surrounding areas, is deeply remembered by the Korean people. Today, the monument dedicated to Dutch forces in *Hoengseong* serves not only as a symbol of that memory but also as a lasting reminder to future generations.

The Republic of Korea has risen from the ashes of war to achieve remarkable development. From one of the poorest nations in the world, Korea has become one of the world's top ten economies. Seoul has transformed into a global metropolis. Freedom and democracy has taken firm root, and Korean culture is beloved by people all over the world. This progress stands as a testament to your sacrifice and dedication.

Your service also laid the foundation for the strong and enduring friendship between Korea and the Netherlands. Recently, I had the privilege of presenting my credentials to His Majesty King *Willem-Alexander*.

During our meeting, His Majesty fondly recalled the State Visit of the Korean President in 2023, and especially the special meeting with Dutch Korean War veterans held at the Royal Palace in Amsterdam. He described it as "a deeply meaningful and moving occasion." His words reminded me once again how your devotion continues to shape and strengthen the special bond between our two countries.

The Korean War was once called 'The Forgotten War.' However, we, and our future generations, will never forget this war.

In this regard, I extend my sincere gratitude to VOKS and the Regiment Van Heutsz for organizing this important gathering every year. Thanks to your efforts, the courage and dedication of the Korean War veterans are being vividly conveyed to Dutch society and future generations.

The government and the Embassy of the Republic of Korea will continue its efforts to honor and remember the Dutch veterans.

We, the Korean people, know all too well what might have happened on the Korean Peninsula without your help. We carry our gratitude forward from generation to generation.
